

### **HIGHLIGHTS 2016**

#### Fought back against government subpoenas of reporters

When the government tries to force reporters to reveal their sources it has a chilling effect and threatens their ability to report on key stories.

- We built a coalition of 36 media organizations to stand up against the government's threat to subpoena 25 hours of outtakes from Mark Boal's interviews with Bowe Bergdahl for season two of the popular podcast "Serial."
- We rallied support from almost 60 organizations for *New York Times* reporter Frances Robles, who had been ordered to testify in a criminal trial. In October, she prevailed, but the case continued into 2017. In October 2017, RCFP filed another brief with the New York Court of Appeals in support of Robles's effort to quash the subpoena.


# Our FOIA lawsuit led to change in FBI policy on agents' impersonation of the media

• In the fall of 2016, the FBI imposed new restrictions on agents' ability to impersonate members of the media, following pressure from the Reporters Committee and other organizations. The change comes after documents released in a FOIA lawsuit showed that the FBI impersonated journalists during the course of a 2007 investigation. Law enforcement impersonating reporters seriously erodes public trust in the media and affects news organizations' ability to gather and report important stories.

The issue is ongoing after it came to light that the FBI set up a fictional production company and agents posed as documentary filmmakers in an investigation following the Malheur National Wildlife Refuge standoff shooting. In 2017, the Reporters Committee filed a lawsuit against the Justice Department and the FBI for records about the FBI's impersonation of documentary filmmakers.

# Tracked threats to reporters and news organizations during the presidential campaign

• The Reporters Committee launched a service to track and respond to interference with newsgathering during the 2016 election. Since the election, attacks on press freedom have escalated, and in one instance in May 2017, Montana congressional candidate Greg Gianforte bodyslammed *Guardian* reporter Ben Jacobs. He was elected to Congress a week later. In the wake of these continuing attacks, we are continuing to monitor, track, and defend against ongoing threats to press freedom.



## **HIGHLIGHTS 2016**

#### Filed a lawsuit to unseal settlement documents in case related to Trump Tower

• RCFP and *Time* magazine filed an application to unseal settlement documents in a class action lawsuit alleging that The Trump Organization and other entities related to Donald J. Trump employed undocumented Polish workers "off the books" in connection with the construction of Trump Tower in New York City.

In 2017, Katie Townsend argued the case for the Reporters Committee before the Court of Appeals for the Second Circuit which sent the case back to the trial court after agreeing with RCFP's argument.

# Brought together tech companies and the news media to fight back against the right to be forgotten

• RCFP Executive Director Bruce Brown raised the alarm and called for collaboration between the news media and the technology sector on the growing threat of "the right to be forgotten," a European law which requires Google to remove search results, and even news articles, on demand.

The Reporters Committee and a media coalition of 28 news and journalist organizations urged the Conseil d'Etat, France's highest administrative court, to strike down an order requiring Google to cleanse search results across all domains worldwide.

# Filed lawsuits against the government on behalf of reporters seeking access to public information

Information is essential for the public to participate in our democracy and to hold government accountable. That's why we regularly work with reporters who are bringing important stories to light.

- Reporters Committee attorneys represented David Yanofsky, a reporter for the Atlantic Media publication *Quartz*, pro bono in a Freedom of Information lawsuit after the Department of Commerce attempted to charge Yanofsky nearly \$174,000 in fees in response to a FOIA request.
- RCFP built a coalition of major national media companies and filed a motion to unseal court documents and 34 letters written on behalf of former Gen. David Petraeus by high-ranking U.S. politicians, world leaders, military officials, and academics. We won, and the contents of the unsealed documents were widely reported in news outlets nationwide.
- RCFP attorneys worked on behalf of the *Tulsa World* and journalist Ziva Branstetter in a case seeking records relating to the state's botched execution of Clayton Lockett. The case is ongoing but has already led to the release of many newsworthy records, earning Branstetter and her colleague Cary Aspinwall a Pultizer Prize nomination. In 2017, after RCFP's challenge, the Oklahoma Legislature amended the Oklahoma Open Records Act. It was signed into law by the Governor earlier this year.



We would not be making the progress with Open Records in Oklahoma without the Reporters Committee for Freedom of the Press.

They took our case in 2014 and have stuck with it through myriad delays, judicial changes, political maneuverings, and unforeseen circumstances. The work done on our behalf by Katie Townsend and Adam Marshall has been substantial and it has elevated journalism in our state.

# RCFP launched a new litigation strategy to expand access to court records concerning the government's secretive use of electronic surveillance tools

• RCFP intervened in an unsealing case filed by journalist Jason Leopold, then of *Vice News*, seeking authorizations from non-active law enforcement investigations for the government's use of certain electronic surveillance tools.

Such secrecy shields a large portion of the federal judiciary from access by the press and the public. After RCFP's intervention, the court released a list of over 200 sealed applications for the use of select surveillance tools that were made by the D.C. U.S. Attorney's Office in 2012.

• In October 2016, RCFP successfully filed an application to unseal court records related to the investigation and prosecution of Stephen Jin-Woo Kim, a former State Department employee who pleaded guilty in 2014 to the unauthorized disclosure of national defense information in connection with an alleged leak to Fox News reporter James Rosen.

# Successfully unsealed transcripts of witness testimony in World War II-era investigation of the Chicago Tribune

• The Reporters Committee, arguing on behalf of historian Elliot Carlson and a coalition of organizations, succeeded in unsealing transcripts of witness testimony from a historic 1942 grand jury investigation of the *Chicago Tribune*.

The investigation of the *Tribune* marks the only time in U.S. history that the government has attempted to prosecute a major newspaper for violating the Espionage Act. The transcripts of witness testimony are now public.



After witnessing the botched execution of Clayton Lockett in 2014, I faced a state government that was stonewalling and dragging its feet, hoping those tactics would make me and the *Tulsa World* give up and settle for officially approved information releases.

RCFP actually reached out to me and the World and asked how they could help. And we gladly took them up on an offer to review our case and eventually to file this litigation. It has already had

historic impact, with a judicial ruling that delay is denial.

Because of their work, and because of RCFP's commitment to supporting this lawsuit and other efforts like it, the state of Oklahoma has changed its policy and promised to begin responding to open records requests in a rational and fair manner.

I am profoundly grateful for RCFP's support of this lawsuit and of our quest for the truth. This is such an important mission in these times of an outright federal assault on the mission of journalism.

The Reporters Committee for Freedom of the Press was founded in 1970 by leading journalists, including Anthony Lukas, Ben Bradlee, Fred Graham, Jack Nelson, Eileen Shanahan, Mike Wallace, Robert Maynard, and Tom Wicker.

The founders built the Reporters Committee from an ad hoc group operating from a desk in the press room at the U.S. Supreme Court to a nationally recognized leader in First Amendment law and advocacy whose work is cited in court opinions, news stories, and throughout the news industry for its thought leadership and practical impact.

While throughout much of its history, the Reporters Committee focused on amicus briefs and developing legal resources for journalists and news organizations, in 2014 we began a direct litigation practice, representing journalists or news organizations in court on a pro bono basis. Today, our staff attorneys work with journalists, news organizations, media lawyers, documentary filmmakers and technology companies on free press issues ranging from access to courts, open government and freedom of information to reporter's privilege, prior restraint, libel and privacy and the establishment of new digital precedents under the First Amendment.

Our mission is to protect the right to gather and distribute news; to keep government accountable by ensuring access to public records, meetings and courtrooms; and to preserve the principles of free speech and unfettered press, as guaranteed by the First Amendment of the U.S. Constitution.
